Broken Bow plans schedule of events for Chautauqua

The community of Broken Bow has planned a five-day schedule of events surrounding the visit June 17-21 of “Bright Dreams, Hard Times: America in the Thirties,” the Nebraska Humanities Council’s 2009 Chautauqua program.

The schedule includes a “Dust Bowl” exhibit of photographs, a youth day camp and youth workshops. Among the opening-day events is a 6 p.m. social to meet the Chautauquans with local entertainment.

Main events will be held each evening June 18-21 at Custer County Fairgrounds at the intersection of Highways 2 and 92. Evening stage performances offer local entertainment and first-person interpretations of historical figures from the era of the Great Depression. Evening Chautauqua sessions begin at 7 p.m. Daytime workshops will be held for adults and youth of all ages.

Scholars will portray five historical characters who helped shape America’s response to the Great Depression. The scholars are Doug Watson as humorist Will Rogers, Patrick McGinnis as President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Fred Krebs as Louisiana governor and U.S. Sen. Huey Long, Tonia M. Compton as evangelist Aimee Semple McPherson and Carmaletta Williams as WPA folklorist Zora Neale Hurston.

A collaboration of the Nebraska Humanities Council and the Kansas Humanities Council, the Chautauqua also visits Plattsmouth June 24-28 and goes to Ottawa and Hesston in Kansas.

The “Bright Dreams, Hard Times” Chautauqua is funded, in part, by a major three-year grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities as part of the NEH’s special “We The People” initiative.
